Call to Order

Board President Mr. Gourley called the meeting of the Culver City Unified School District Board of Education to order at 6:00 p.m. The Board adjourned to Closed Session at 6:01 p.m. and reconvened the public meeting at 7:05 p.m. with all Board members in attendance. Mr. Neil Rubenstein led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Report from Closed Session

Mr. Gourley reported that the Governing Board met in Closed Session regarding issues listed on today's Closed Session agenda and announced that no reportable actions were taken.

8. Adoption of Agenda

It was moved by Mr. Zeidman to adopt the agenda of June 8, 2010 with the amendment to move the 10.1 items, Awards, Recognitions and Presentations, up on the agenda to follow item 8.0. The motion was seconded by Ms. Siever. The motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Gourley moved to adjourn the meeting in memory of Mr. Albert Vera. Mr. Zeidman seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

10. Awards, Recognitions and Presentations

10.1 Student All League Athlete Recognition

Mr. Jerry Chabola introduced athletes from Culver City High School, and informed the Board of their accomplishments. Mr. Chabola also named some of the colleges and universities that the athletes had been accepted to. He announced the upcoming Athlete of the Year Awards. Additional recognitions came from Culver City Middle School Teachers Ruth Morris and Adam Adamucci. Ms. Morris and Mr. Adamucci provided information on the history of the chess tournament team. They explained how they partnered with Mr. Neil Rubenstein to have a chess tournament to benefit the Toby Rubenstein Foundation. Ms. Morris and Mr. Adamucci introduced the top three winners of the tournament. Mr. Rubenstein spoke about how important the tournament was to the Rubenstein family and thanked the Board for their recognition of the tournament.

10.2 <u>Culver City Education Foundation – Building Blocks for Education</u>

Ami Schultz, Trustee from the Culver City Education Foundation presented Building Blocks to Patty Krause, Karen Pyenson, and Glenn Alexander. Mrs. Krause gave a brief speech thanking the Corwin-Nusbaum family for the Building Block and spoke about what a great city Culver City was. She also thanked all of the companies that have donated so generously to the District. Ms. Alexander accepted the Building Block for her son Glenn.

10.3 <u>Culver City Unified School District Retiree Recognition</u>

Dr. Coté and the Assistant Superintendent introduced the retirees and read their accomplishments. The retirees were given a certificate, and Mrs. Jaffe named the retirees that were unable to attend the meeting.

9. Consent Agenda

Mr. Gourley called the Consent Agenda and asked if any member of the audience or the Board wished to withdraw any item. Ms. Siever requested that 9.1 and 9.4 be withdrawn. It was moved by Mr. Zeidman and seconded by Ms. Paspalis to approve Consent Agenda Items 9.2, 9.3, and 9.5 - 9.9 as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

9.1 Approval is Recommended for the Minutes of Regular Meeting – May 25, 2010

Ms. Siever requested this item be withdrawn to add language on item 14.1b page 108 under her comment that begins with "Ms. Siever stated she initially..." in the middle of the page. She requested to add that she stated she intended on voting to approve the item. Mr. Silbiger requested an addition to item 14.2b on page 107 for clarification to staff. The information he would like included in the immersion program presentation is the following: 1) an update on the FLAP grant; 2) suggestions from staff for any improvement to the program; and 3) the current immersion program at the secondary level. It was moved by Mr. Silbiger and seconded by Ms. Siever to approve the Minutes of Regular Meeting – May 25, 2010 as amended. The motion was unanimously approved.

9.4 Approval is Recommended for the Certificated Personnel Reports No. 21

Ms. Siever withdrew this item to express that she felt one of the problems she had with the reports was that there were no costs mentioned. She also wanted to know which budgets were being used. Ms. Siever gave suggestions on how the reports could be presented to the Board so they would be easier to follow. Mr. Delawalla clarified that the money shown in the report is for the following school year. It was moved by Ms. Siever and seconded by Ms. Paspalis that the Board approve the Certificated Personnel Reports No. 21 as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

11. Public Recognition

11.1 Superintendent's Report

Dr. Coté reported on her attendance with La Ballona Principal Chris Collins, and teachers Ira Proctor and Debbie Ishii, to the 2010 Distinguished Schools Awards ceremony at the Disneyland Hotel. Dr. Coté commented on how poised and confident the 8th graders were at the 8th grade Exit Interviews at Culver City Middle School. She stated that their portfolios reflected three years of hard work and accomplishments. Dr. Coté also reported that she had a "Coffee and Chat" with the highest bidder from Linwood Howe's Buckaroo Bash. It was a great opportunity to hear about all of the wonderful things happening at Linwood Howe. Dr. Coté then thanked the student Board representatives, Evan Wilson from the middle school and Noya Kansky from the high school, for doing such a great job.

11.2 Assistant Superintendents' Reports

Ms. Laura stated she had enjoyed having Evan Wilson and Noya Kansky at the meeting and wished them good luck. Ms. Laura reported that her department was looking at the accountability data and making plans and goals for the 2010-2011 school year, and thanked the technical staff. Ms. Laura reported on the final Anti-Bullying Committee meeting, and stated that parent participation was growing. She extended an invitation to AVPA's Java Gala which was to be on Saturday.

Mr. Delawalla reported that he was continuing to work on the budget for the upcoming school year. He stated it would be presented at the next meeting. Ms. Paspalis inquired about the status on the energy savings. Mr. Delawalla stated he had received the energy audit from Southern California Edison, and he is presently working with the vendors to get costs analysis, and hopefully the information would be received in the upcoming week. Mr. Zeidman inquired about renting out the District parking lot over the summer. Mr. Gourley and Ms. Paspalis agreed they would like to have additional information brought to the Board on this matter.

Mrs. Jaffe thanked all of the organizations for signing off on the furlough days. She reported that the proposed furlough days would be August 25th, November 22nd and 23rd, January 24th, and May 27th for the 2010-2011 school year. For the Office of Child Development, because they have mandated days, their furlough days would be August 25th and 26th, November 22nd and 23rd, January 24th, May 27th, and one flex-day. Ms. Jaffe also reported on the Exit Portfolios for the BTSA Program and shared some of the responses from the teachers.

11.3 Members of the Audience

Members of the audience spoke about:

- Bonnie Seeberger stated she did not agree with a parent from a previous meeting who stated the music
 program at the middle school was not working. She spoke in favor of keeping the music program and
 commended the students in the program and Mr. Nazzaretta.
- Jerry Chabola thanked the Board for requesting additional information on the rental of the parking lot. He commented that he had sent two different quotes to the Board for synthetic turf and thinks that the District needs to do something to generate money. Mr. Chabola stated that Helms Field looked nice at the moment for the graduation ceremony, but invited the Board to look at the field after graduation. He extended an invitation to the upcoming Bowling Tournament on Saturday. Mr. Silbiger stated he had received several e-mails and phone calls regarding the synthetic turf, and asked Dr. Coté when the Board would receive more information. Dr. Coté stated that the priority for Mr. Delawalla had to be the budget at this time, but the information would be presented later in the year. Ms. Siever suggested that she and Mr. Chabola meet with Mr. Larry Eisenberg to get additional information. Mr. Zeidman suggested going to a professional that specifically handles synthetic turfs. Further discussion ensued about information that could be gathered to save Mr. Delawalla time, and then provide Mr. Delawalla with that information for additional follow-up.

11.4 Student Representatives' Reports

Middle School Student Representative

Evan Wilson, Culver City Middle School Student Representative, reported on activities at Culver City Middle School, including the upcoming Variety Show; the June 10th Awards Night for the 8th grade; the 8th grade yearbook signing; the 8th grade picnic; and the 6th grade trip to The Plunge.

Culver Park Student Representative

Jessica Romo, Culver Park High School Student Representative, was not present.

Culver City High School Student Representative/Student Board Member

Noya Kansky, Student Board Member, reported on activities at Culver City High School, including Summerfest which had a circus theme this year; the athletics awards; the AVPA Java Gala fundraiser; the upcoming Community Scholarships event on June 15th; the freshman and sophomores taking their finals; and the Club of the Year Award.

11.5 Members of the Board

Board Members spoke about:

Ms. Siever stated she would not be able to attend the AVPA event, but she would buy tickets to support
the group and volunteer them to the student representatives. She stated she would arrange a meeting with
Larry Eisenberg and Mr. Chabola regarding the synthetic turf. She spoke briefly on the passing of Albert
Vera and how he contributed to the community.

- Mr. Silbiger thanked Evan Wilson and Noya Kansky for their hard work in representing their schools at the Board meeting. He commented on his visit to Sony to see the AVPA films and thought they were incredible. He thanked Sony for their work with the District. Mr. Silbiger stated that he saw "Yellow Boat" which was done by all seniors and he was very impressed. He reported on his attendance at Mary and Michael Neighbors' retirement parties, and his attendance at all three music programs. Mr. Silbiger gave a brief history of the music programs.
- Mr. Gourley thanked the student representatives for their service. He asked Dr. Coté if people were notified about Ms. Silver being brought back to the District. Dr. Coté confirmed Ms. Silver's supporters had been notified. Mr. Gourley stated he would like to discuss having a field trip to the Natatorium with parents, builders, and any other interested parties. He confirmed that he does not want anyone using the fields at the school sites if they do not have a permit. Mr. Zeidman would like the issue of restroom usage after school hours be brought back. Culver City High School

What Is:

Currently, Culver City High School offers an AVID elective for freshman and sophomore classes and the AVID College Readiness Course for juniors and seniors. In both classes, students work in tutorial groups through subject matter curriculum. In some cases, college tutors are hired and paid to facilitate the tutorial groups. In recent years, students in advanced classes have served as cross age tutors in AVID classrooms. This year, CCHS students have worked as AVID tutors in AVID classes at CCMS, as well. The students are trained in AVID tutorial methodologies. At this time, the students are identified as TAs (teacher assistants) and receive credit on their transcripts as such. This course is intended to formalize the situation and provide a more accurate course description for the work these students are doing.

What Needs To Be:

- 1) This course is intended to be supplemental.
- 2) This course is not intended to be UC approved.
- 3) This course would be limited to students with a minimum GPA of 3.0.
- 4) This course is intended for 11th and 12th grade students.
- 5) Tutors will be selected based on demonstrated proficiency in higher level mathematics and science courses.

Implications:

Considerations:

- 1) Scheduling and programming: The AVID Tutor course will be scheduled concurrently with the AVID elective courses. Some students may be scheduled to work with in classrooms during the Middle School AVID program.
- 2) Facilities: There are no facility considerations for implementing this course.
- 3) Equipment, materials, supplies: There is no textbook required for this course. AVID teachers will use AVID curriculum and materials for training the tutors. Copies of handouts will be the primary (minimal) materials cost.
- 4) Personnel: Current AVID teachers will instruct and supervise students in the AVID Tutor course. No additional sections or staff will be required to implement this course.
- 5) Other (fees): No fees or costs are required to implement this course.
- 6) Implementation: In effect, this course has already been actualized under the auspices of "TA." Students occupying this role will be assigned in a similar manner, but under a different course title and section number. There is no substantial preparation required to implement the course.

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

A student identified as an individual with <u>a disability pursuant to the Individuals with</u>

<u>Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEA), 20 USC 1400-1482, disabilities</u>

pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is subject to the same grounds for suspension and expulsion which that apply to students without disabilities.

(cf. 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process)
(cf. 6159.1 - Procedural Safeguards and Complaints for Special Education)

Procedures for Students Not Yet Eligible for Special Education Services

A student who has not been identified as an individual with disabilities pursuant to IDEA and who has engaged in behavior that violatesed the district's code of student conduct may assert any of the protections under IDEA only if the district had a basis of knowledge that the student is disabled before the behavior that precipitated the disciplinary action occurred. (20 USC 1415(k)(5); 34 CFR 300.534) disciplinary procedures may assert the procedural safeguards granted under this administrative regulation only if the district had knowledge that the student was disabled before the behavior occurred.

The district shall be deemed to have <u>a basic of</u> knowledge that the student had <u>has</u> a disability if one of the following conditions exists: (20 USC 1415(k)(5); 34 CFR 300.534)

1. The parent/guardian has expressed concern in writing to district supervisory or administrative personnel or to a teacher of the student in writing, or orally if the parent/guardian does not know how to write or has a disability that prevents a written statement, that the student is in need of special education and or related services.

The behavior or performance of the student demonstrates the need for such services, in accordance with 34 CFR 300.7.

- 2. The parent/guardian has requested an evaluation of the student for special education pursuant to 34 CFR 300.530-300.536. CFR 300.300-300.311. (cf. 6164.4 Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education)
- 3. The teacher of the student or other district personnel has expressed specific concerns about a pattern of behavior demonstrated by the child about the Behavior or performance of the student directly to the district's special education administrator assistant director of special education or to other supervisory district personnel about a pattern of behavior demonstrated by the student. in accordance with the district's established child find or special education referral system.

Students AR 5144.2(b)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

The district would NOT be deemed to not have a basis of knowledge that a student is a child with a disability is disabled if the parent/guardian has not allowed the student to be evaluated for special education services or has refused services. In addition, the district would NOT be deemed to not have a basis of knowledge if the student had been evaluated district conducted an evaluation pursuant to 34 CFR 300.300-300.311 and determined to NOT be a child with a disability, that the student was not an individual with a disability and provided notice to the perent/guardian of its determination.—When the district does NOT is deemed to not have a basis of knowledge that a student is a child with a of the disability, the student shall be disciplined in accordance with procedures established for students without disabilities who engage in comparable behavior. (20 USC 1415(k)(5); 34 CFR 300.534)

The district would be deemed to not have knowledge as specified in items #1-4 above if, as a result of receiving such information, the district either conducted an evaluation and determined that the student was not a student with a disability or determined that an evaluation was not necessary and provided notice to the parent/guardian of its determination.

If it is determined that the district did not have knowledge that the student was disabled prior to taking disciplinary action against the student, then the student shall be disciplined in accordance with procedures established for students without disabilities.

If a request is made for an evaluation of a student during the time period in which the student is subject to disciplinary measures, the evaluation shall be conducted in an expedited manner. Until the evaluation is completed, the student shall remain in the educational placement determined by school authorities, which can include suspension or expulsion without educational services. If the student is determined to be a child with a disability, taking into consideration information from the evaluation conducted by the district and information provided by the parents, the district must provide special education and related services pursuant to the requirements of the IDEA. (20 USC 1415(k)(5); 34 CFR 300.534)

Suspension

The Superintendent or designee may suspend a student with a disability for up to 10 consecutive school days for a single incident of misconduct, and for up to 20 school days in a school year, in the same manner as a student without a disability as long as the suspension(s) do not constitute a change in placement pursuant to 34 CFR 300.519-536. (34 CFR 300.530; Education Code 48903)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

The principal or designee shall monitor the number of days, including portions of days, that students <u>in which a student</u> with valid <u>an</u> individualized education programs (IEP) have <u>has</u> been suspended during the school year.

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program)

The district shall determine, on a case-by-case basis, whether a pattern of removals of a student from his/her current educational placement for disciplinary reasons constitutes a change of placement. A change of placement shall be deemed to have occurred under any of the following circumstances: (34 CFR 300.536)

- 1. The removal is for more than 10 consecutive school days.
- 2. The student has been subjected to a series of removals that constitute a pattern because of all of the following:
 - a. The series of removals total more than 10 school days in a school year.
 - b. The student's behavior is substantially similar to his/her behavior in previous incidents that resulted in the series of removals.
 - c. Additional factors, such as the length of each removal, the total amount of time the student has been removed, and the proximity of the removals to one another, indicate a change of placement.

Services During Suspension

Any student suspended for more than 10 school days in the same school year shall continue to receive services during the term of the suspension. School personnel, in consultation with at least one of the student's teachers, shall determine the extent to which services are needed as provided in 34 CFR 300.101(a), so as to enable the student to continue to participate in the general education curriculum in another setting and to progress toward meeting the goals as set out in his/her IEP. (20 USC 1412(a)(1)(A); 34 CFR 300.530)

If the removal has been determined to be a change of placement as specified in items #1-2 above, the student's IEP team shall determine the appropriate educational services. (34 CFR 300.530)

Students suspended for more than 10 school days in a school year shall continue to receive services beginning on the 11th day, to the extent necessary to provide the student a free and appropriate public education.

If a student with disabilities a disability is excluded from school bus transportation, the student is entitled to shall be provided with an alternative form of transportation at no

cost to the student or parent/guardian, provided that transportation is specified in the student's IEP. (EC 48915.5)

(cf. 3541.2 - Transportation for Students with Disabilities)

Interim Alternative Educational Setting (IAES) Placement Due to Dangerous Behavior

A student with a disability may be placed in an appropriate interim alternative educational setting for up to 45 days when he/she commits one of the following acts:

The district may unilaterally place a student with a disability in an appropriate interim alternative educational setting for up to 45 school days, without regard to whether the behavior is a manifestation of the student's disability, when the student commits one of the following acts while at school, going to or from school, or at a school-related function: (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(G); 34 CFR 300.530)

- 1. Carries a <u>dangerous</u> weapon, as defined in 18 USC 930, <u>and/or any device which is capable of causing death or serious bodily injury to school or to a school function.</u>
- 2. Knowingly possesses or uses illegal drugs while at school or a school function
- 3. Sells or solicits the sale of a controlled substance while at school or a school activity as identified in 21 USC 812 (c), Schedules I-V

The student's <u>interim</u> alternatives educational setting shall be determined by the student's IEP team. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(G); 34 CFR 300.531)

A hearing officer may order a change in placement of a student with a disability to an appropriate interim educational setting if the hearing officer:

- 1. Determines that the district has established by substantial evidence, meaning beyond a preponderance of the evidence, that maintaining the current placement of the student is substantially likely to result in injury to the student or others
- 2. Considers the appropriateness of the student's current placement
- 3. Considers whether the district has made reasonable efforts to minimize the risk of harm in the student's current placement, including the use of supplementary aids and services
- 4. Determines that the interim alternative educational setting proposed by school personnel who have met with the student's special education teacher allows the student to:

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

a. Progress in the general curriculum and continue to receive those services and modifications, including those described in his/her IEP, to enable the student to meet the goals of the IEP

b. Receive services and modifications designed to address the behavior and ensure that the behavior does not recur

The student may be placed in the interim alternative educational setting for up to 45 days, or until the conclusion of any due process hearing proceedings requested by the parent/guardian.

Behavioral Assessment and Intervention Plan

On the date the decision to take disciplinary action is made, the parents/guardians of the student shall be notified of the decision and provided the procedural safeguards notice pursuant to 34 CFR 300.504. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(H); 34 CFR 300.530)

A student who has been removed from his/her current placement because of dangerous behavior shall receive services, although in another setting, to the extent necessary to allow him/her to participate in the general education curriculum and to progress toward meeting the goals set out in his/her IEP. As appropriate, the student shall also receive a functional behavioral assessment and behavioral intervention services and modifications that are designed to address the behavior violation so that it does not recur. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(D); 34 CFR 300.530)

Not later than 10 business days after a student has been suspended for more than 10 school days or placed in an alternative educational setting, the district shall convene an IEP team meeting to conduct a functional behavior assessment and implement a behavioral intervention plan. If the student already has a behavioral intervention plan, the IEP team shall review the plan and modify it as necessary to address the behavior.

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program) (cf. 6159.4 - Behavioral Interventions for Special Education Students)

As soon as practicable after developing the behavioral intervention plan and completing the required assessments, the IEP team shall meet to develop appropriate behavioral intervention to address the behavior and shall implement those interventions.

Procedural Safeguards/Manifestation Determination

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

The following procedural safeguards shall apply when a student <u>with a disability</u> is suspended for more than 10 consecutive school days, when disciplinary action is contemplated for a dangerous behavior as described above, when a series of removals of a student constitutes a pattern, or when a change of placement <u>of a student</u> is contemplated <u>due to a violation of the district's code of conduct:</u>

1. Notice: On the date the decision to take disciplinary action is made, the parents/guardians of the student shall be notified of the decision and provided the procedural safeguards notice pursuant to 34 CFR 300.504. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(H); 34 CFR 300.530)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parent Notifications) (cf. 6159.1 - Procedural Safeguards and Complaints for Special Education)

The parents/guardians of the student shall be immediately notified of the decision and provided the procedural safeguards notice pursuant to 34 CFR 300.504 on the day the decision to take action is made.

2. <u>Manifestation Determination Review:</u> Immediately if possible, but in no case later than 10 school days after the date of the decision to take disciplinary action is made, a manifestation determination review shall be made of the relationship between the student's disability and the behavior subject to the disciplinary action. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(E); 34 CFR 300.530)

At the manifestation determination review, the district, the student's parent/guardian, and relevant members of the IEP team (as determined by the district and parent/guardian) shall review all relevant information in the student's file, including the student's IEP, any teacher observations, and any relevant information provided by the parents/guardians, to determine whether the conduct in question was either of the following: (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(E); 34 CFR 300.530)

- a. Caused by or had a direct and substantial relationship to the student's disability.
- b. A direct result of the district's failure to implement the student's IEP, in which case the district shall take immediate steps to remedy those deficiencies.

If the manifestation review team determines that a condition in either a. or b. above was met, the conduct shall then be determined to be a manifestation of the student's disability. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(E); 34 CFR 300.530)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

3. Determination that Behavior is a Manifestation of the Student's Disability:
When the conduct has been determined to be a manifestation of the student's disability, the IEP team shall conduct a functional behavioral assessment, unless a functional behavioral assessment had been conducted before the occurrence of the behavior that resulted in the change of placement, and shall implement a behavioral intervention plan for the student. If a behavioral intervention plan has already been developed, the IEP team shall review the behavioral intervention plan and modify it as necessary to address the behavior. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(F); 34 CFR 300.530)

The student shall be returned to the placement from which he/she was removed, unless the parent/guardian and district agree to a change of placement as part of the modification of the behavioral intervention plan. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(F); 34 CFR 300.530)

(cf. 6159.4 - Behavioral Interventions for Special Education Students)

4. Determination that Behavior is Not a Manifestation of the Student's Disability: If the manifestation determination review team determines that the student's behavior was not a manifestation of his/her disability, the student may be disciplined in accordance with the procedures for students without disabilities. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(D); 34 CFR 300.530)

The student shall receive services to the extent necessary to participate in the general education curriculum in another setting and to allow him/her to progress toward meeting the goals set out in his/her IEP. As appropriate, the student also shall receive a functional behavioral assessment and behavioral intervention services and modifications that are designed to address the behavior violation so that it does not recur. (20 USC 1415(k)(1)(D); 34 CFR 300.530)

(cf. 6158 - Independent Study School)

(cf. 6185 - Community Day School)

At this review, the IEP team and other qualified personnel shall consider, in terms of the behavior subject to the disciplinary action, all relevant information, including:

- a. Evaluation and diagnostic results, including the results or other relevant information supplied by the student's parent/guardians
- b. Observations of the student
- c. The student's IEP and placement

In relationship to the behavior subject to the disciplinary action, the team shall then determine whether the IEP and placement: (1) were appropriate; (2) whether supplementary aids, services, and behavioral interventions strategies were provided consistent with the student's IEP and placement; (3) also determined that the student's disability did not impair the ability of the student to understand the impact and consequences of the behavior; (4) did not impair his/her ability to control the behavior subject to the disciplinary action.

If the team determines that the student's behavior was not a manifestation of his/her disability, then the student may be disciplined in accordance with the procedures for students without disabilities, as long as the student continues to receive services to the extent necessary to provide that student a free and appropriate public education.

If the team determines that the student's behavior was a manifestation of his/her disability, then the student's placement may be changed only via the IEP process.

Due Process Appeals

If the parent/guardian disagrees with any district decision regarding placement under 34 CFR 300.530 (suspension and removal for dangerous circumstances) or 34 CFR 300.531 (interim alternative placement), or the manifestation determination under 34 CFR 300.530(e), he/she may appeal the decision by requesting a hearing. The district may request a hearing if the district believes that maintaining the student's current placement is substantially likely to result in injury to the student or others. In order to request a hearing, the requesting party shall file a complaint pursuant to 34 CFR 300.507 and 300.508(a) and (b). (20 USC 1415(k)(3); 34 CFR 300.532)

Whenever a hearing is requested as specified above, the parent/guardian or the district shall have an opportunity for an expedited due process hearing consistent with requirements specified in 34 CFR 300.507, 300.508 (a)-(c), and 300.510-300.514.

If the student's parent/guardian or the district has initiated a due process hearing under 34 CFR 300.532, as detailed above, the student shall remain in the interim alternative educational setting pending the decision of the hearing officer or until the expiration of the 45-day time period, whichever occurs first, unless the parent/guardian and district agree otherwise. (20 USC 1415(k)(4); 34 CFR 300.533)

If the parent/guardian disagrees with a decision that the behavior was not a manifestation of the student's disability or with any decision regarding placement, he/she has a right to appeal the decision.

Students AR 5144.2(i)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

If the student's parent/guardian initiates a due process hearing to challenge the interim alternative educational setting or the manifestation determination, the student shall remain in the interim alternative setting pending the decision of the hearing officer or the expiration of the 45-day time period, whichever occurs first, unless the parent/guardian and district agree otherwise.

If school personnel maintain that it is dangerous for the student to be placed in the current placement (placement prior to removal to the interim alternative education setting), during the pendency of the due process proceedings, the Superintendent or designee may request an expedited due process hearing.

Services During Expulsion

Expelled students shall continue to receive services during the term of the expulsion to the extent necessary to provide the student a free, and appropriate public education. Any alternative program must provide services to the extent necessary to enable the student to appropriately progress in the general curriculum and appropriately advance toward achieving the goals set out in the student's IEP.

(cf. 6158 - Independent Study) (cf. 6185 - Community Day School)

Readmission

Readmission procedures for students with disabilities shall be the same as those used for all students. Upon readmission, an IEP team meeting shall be convened.

Suspension of Expulsion

The Board's criteria for suspending the enforcement of an expulsion order shall be applied to students with disabilities in the same manner as they are applied to all other students. (EC 48917)

Notification to Law Enforcement Authorities

Law enforcement notification requirements involving students with disabilities shall be the same as those specified for all students in AR 5144.1 – Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process.

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES)

Prior to the suspension or expulsion of any student, the principal or designee shall notify appropriate city or county law enforcement authorities of any student acts of assault which may have violated Penal Code 245.

The principal or designee also shall notify appropriate city or county law enforcement authorities of any student acts which may involve the possession or sale of narcotics or of a controlled substance or possession of weapons or firearms in violation of Penal Code 626.9 and 626.10.

Within one school day after a student's suspension or expulsion, the principal or designee shall notify appropriate city or county law enforcement authorities, by telephone or other appropriate means, of any student acts which may violate Education Code 48900 (c) or (d), relating to the possession, use, offering or sale of controlled substances, alcohol or intoxicants of any kind.

Report to County Superintendent of Schools

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the County Superintendent of Schools when any special education student has been expelled or suspended for more than 10 school days. The report shall include the student's name, last known address, and the reason for the action. (Education Code 48203)

14.2f <u>Approval is Recommended for the Third Reading and Adoption of Revised Board Policy/Administrative Regulation 1250 – Community Relations, Visitors</u>

It is recommended practice that the Board of Education regularly review Board Policies/Administrative Regulations that are significant to the operation of the district. A new Board Policy/Administrative Regulation on Community Relations, Visitors is now being presented for a third reading and adoption.

RECOMMENDED MOTION:

VISITORS/OUTSIDERS

The Governing Board encourages parents/guardians and interested members of the community to visit the schools and view the educational program.

The Superintendent or designee shall invite parents/guardians and the community to open house activities and other special events.

To ensure minimum interruption of the instructional program, visits during school hours should be arranged 24 hours in advance with the teacher, principal, administrator or designee of District facilities. The teacher and principal will determine whether proposed times and length for visitation or observation may be disruptive of instruction or not in the best interest of students. A parent-requested classroom observation is limited to 20 minutes. the Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures which facilitate visits during regular school days. Visits during school hours should be first arranged with the teacher and/or principal or designee. If a conference is desired, an appointment should be set with the teacher during non-instructional time.

For purposes of this policy, a visitor includes not only those defined by law as outsiders, but also a parent/guardian of a nupil in the school or a person required by his or her employment to be in the school building or on the school grounds.

To ensure the safety of students and staff and avoid potential disruptions, all visitors shall identify themselves to the principal or designee upon entering the school grounds. The principal or designee may refuse to register or may revoke the registration of any visitor if he/she reasonably concludes that the visitor's presence or acts would disrupt the school, students, or employees.

All visitors shall register in accordance with law immediately upon entering any school building or grounds when school is in session, and visitor badges shall be worn by all visitors while on eampus.

(Penal Code 627.2)

(cf. 3515.2 – Disruptions)

For purposes of school safety and security, the principal or designee shall design for his/her site a visible means of identification for visitors while on school premises. <u>Visitor badges shall be worn by all visitors while on campus.</u>

No electronic listening or recording device may be used in a classroom, or any other areas of the campus, without the teacher's and principal's permission.

The Board of Education believes all employees should have the opportunity to carry out their duties and interactions with the public in a professional manner. The Board affirms that employees, volunteers, and students should not be subjected to

abusive behavior. Abusive behavior is defined as the use of obscenities, yelling, or defamatory language, the use of any threatening words or phrases, or the use of any threatening behavior to intimidate or otherwise berate employees, volunteers, and students.

This policy is not intended to deprive any person of his/her right to freedom of expression, but only to maintain a safe workplace for students and staff. The District seeks public cooperation with this endeavor.

When a visitor acts in an abusive manner towards employees, volunteers or students, the following steps shall be followed:

- 1. <u>In a professional manner, district employees shall remind individuals who may be exhibiting abusive behavior that they may not exhibit such behavior.</u>
- 2. If the individual does not conform his/her behavior when reminded, the district employee shall terminate the meeting, conference, or telephone conversation. If the meeting or conference is on district premises, the offending party will be asked to leave. The employee shall immediately notify his/her supervisor of the incident, and if requested, provide a written report of the incident.
- 3. <u>If an individual refuses to leave upon request or returns before the applicable period of time, the principal or designee may notify district security, law enforcement personnel and/or Superintendent's designee.</u>
- 4. The principal shall consult with the Superintendent's designee concerning what additional legal remedies may be warranted to protect the employee on the basis of the specific facts and circumstances of the disruption.

VISITORS/OUTSIDERS

For purposes of this policy, a visitor includes not only those defined by law as outsiders, but also a parent/guardian of a pupil in the school or a person required by his or her employment to be in the school building or on the school grounds.

<u>Unless otherwise directed by the principal or designee, a staff member shall accompany visitors while they are on school grounds.</u>

Visitor Registration

Any person other than the following is considered a visitor--and is required to register upon entering school premises.

- 1. A student of the school, unless currently under suspension or expelled from the district.
- 2. A Governing Board member or district officer or employee.
- 3. A sehool district <u>public</u> employee, contractor or service employee whose employment requires being on school grounds, or any person who is on school grounds at the school's request.

Registration Procedure

In order to register, except on public election day, a visitor shall upon request, a visitor shall furnish the principal or designee the following information:

- 1. His/her name, address and occupation.
- 2. His/her age, if less than 21.
- 3. His/her purpose for entering school grounds.
- 4. Proof of identity.

Refusal or Revocation of Registration

1. The principal or designee may refuse to register any visitor if he/she reasonably concludes that the visitor's presence or acts would disrupt the school, students, or employees; would result in damage to property; or would result in the distribution or use of a controlled substance. The principal or designee or school security officer may revoke a visitor's registration if he/she has a reasonable basis for concluding that the visitor's presence on school grounds would interfere or is interfering with the peaceful conduct of school activities or would disrupt or is disrupting the school, students or staff. (Penal Code 627.4)

(cf. 3515.2 – Disruptions)

2. The principal or designee may request that a visitor who has failed to register, or whose registration privileges have been denied or revoked, promptly leave school grounds. When a visitor is directed to leave, the principal or designee shall inform the visitor that if he/she re-enters the school within seven days he/she will be guilty of a misdemeanor subject to a fine and/or imprisonment.

Appeal Procedure

Any person who is asked to leave a public school building or grounds may appeal to the Superintendent or designee in writing. This appeal shall be made no later than the second school day after the person has departed from the school building or grounds. The Superintendent or designee shall render his/her decision within 24 hours after the appeal is made, and this decision shall be binding upon both parties.

Any person who is denied registration or whose registration is revoked may request a hearing before the principal or Superintendent on the propriety of the denial or revocation. The request shall be in writing, shall state why the denial or revocation was improper, shall give the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent, and shall be delivered to either the principal or the Superintendent within five days after the denial or revocation. The principal or Superintendent shall promptly mail a written notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing to the person who requested the hearing. A hearing before the principal shall be held within seven days after the principal receives the request. A hearing before the Superintendent shall be held within seven days after the Superintendent receives the request. (Penal Code 627.5)

Any person who is requested to leave a public school building or school grounds may appeal to the Superintendent of the school district in which the public school is located. That appeal shall be made not later than the second succeeding school day after the person has departed from the public school building or public school grounds. The Superintendent shall, after reviewing the matter with the principal, or the designee of the principal, and the person seeking ingress to the public school during school hours, render his or her decision within 24 hours after the appeal is made, and the decision shall be binding upon both parties. A decision of the Superintendent may be appealed by the person seeking ingress to the public school during public school hours to the governing board of the school district in which the public school is located. That appeal shall be made not later than the second succeeding school day after the Superintendent has rendered his or her decision. The governing board of the school district shall consider and decide the appeal at its next scheduled regular or adjourned regular public meeting, and the decision of the governing board shall be final. (Education Code §32211(c))

Response to Violations of BP 1250 and BP 1313

The appropriate response to violations of Board Policy 1250 and Board Policy 1313 is determined by the administrator in charge in consultation with the employee. The following progressive steps are guidelines only. Depending upon the type and severity of the conduct involved, any step in the process may be repeated or omitted, as appropriate. Questions as to whether a parent/guardian or community member's conduct should be addressed pursuant to this regulation should be directed to the administrator in charge.

1. Oral Warning

In the event of a violation such as those identified below, the individual will receive an oral warning from the **seheel** administrator or his/her designee. If the administrator is the victim of a violation, the Superintendent or designee will conduct the warning.

a. Examples of infractions that would warrant an oral warning:

- (1) A visitor entering a classroom or any school area without prior appointment or checking in at the office.
- (2) A visitor who becomes disruptive to classroom/office or school/district operations while on school/district property.
- (3) A visitor who becomes verbally abusive to a teacher, staff member, or student while on school/district property.
- (4) A person who makes frequent inappropriate, unnecessary, or disruptive telephone calls to the school, district office, or home of staff members.

b. Procedure for oral warning:

- (1) A conference will be scheduled with the individual and the administrator or the immediate supervisor of the employee involved.
- (2) The administrator/supervisor conducting the conference will keep a written record of the conference.
- (3) The Superintendent or designee is informed in writing of the infraction, the conference, and any necessary follow-up information.

2. Written Warning

a. Examples of infractions that would warrant a written warning:

- (1) Repeated conduct described in 1(a), after one oral warning has been given.
- (2) A person verbally or physically disrupts a class, assembly, meeting, or school site, or district office.

- (3) A person hinders a school district employee from performing his/her work.
- (4) A person uses inappropriate language or gestures toward a teacher, staff member, or student.
- (5) A person who sends frequent inappropriate, unnecessary, or harassing e-mails to a district employee, Board Member, the school, or district office.

b. Procedure for written warning:

- (1) The administrator, Superintendent or designee, sends a letter to the person by certified mail-or renlies to an inappropriate, unnecessary, or harassing e-mail with a written warning.
- (2) The letter/e-mail specifies the date, place, and approximate time of the conduct, provides a description of the conduct and its disruptive or distressing result, and includes a copy of Board Policy 1250 and/or Board Policy 1313. The letter/e-mail also directs the parent/guardian or community member not to engage in such conduct in the future, and cautions that further conduct of a disruptive nature will not be tolerated.

3. Written Stay-Away Order

a. Examples of infractions that would warrant a stay-away order:

- (1) A visitor enters school or district property without lawful business, interferes with the peaceful conduct of school activities, and refuses to leave or reenters after being requested to leave the premises.
- (2) The administrator or designee has reasonable cause to believe a visitor intends or has willfully disrupted the orderly operation of the school or facility.
- (3) A person/visitor threatens an administrator, employee, or student by telephone or on school property.

b. Procedure for stay-away order

- (1) The Superintendent or designee, in consultation with district legal counsel, sends a letter to the person by certified mail, advising the person of the conduct resulting in the stay-away order and directing the person not to enter school property.
- (2) A copy of the letter is sent to the local law enforcement agency and to the administrator.
- (3) The administrator informs appropriate employees, such as campus security, that the individual's permission to enter the campus has been withdrawn.
- (4) Re-entry to campus property prior to the expiration of the order is documented, and local law enforcement is notified. (Such re-entry during this period is a misdemeanor.)

4. Restraining Order Through Superior Court

A restraining order may be sought, with the assistance of legal counsel, only under specific circumstances. The restraining order is not an automatic step in progressive application of this regulation, but is a response to particular conduct as provided by law.

a. Conduct that would warrant seeking a restraining order:

- (1) A person/visitor engages in harassment of a specific person, consisting of violence, credible threat of violence, or a course of conduct that causes substantial emotional distress to the person at whom it is directed.
- (2) If the District and legal counsel agree, legal counsel prepares paperwork to seek a temporary restraining order from the Superior Court. Such paperwork may include sworn declarations from the district employees or other witnesses involved.
- (3) If the court grants the temporary restraining order, legal counsel will consult with the District as to whether to seek a permanent injunction for up to three years. Seeking a permanent injunction may require the presence and testimony of district witnesses in court to support the request.
- (4) If the injunction is granted by the court, district legal counsel serves the defendant with a copy of the injunction, and provides a copy to local law enforcement. The District is responsible for providing copies of the injunction to school sites, as appropriate.
- (5) The decision to grant or deny an injunction is made by the court; therefore, there is no guarantee an injunction will be granted. However, denial of an injunction does not prevent the District from addressing conduct through one of the other steps listed above.

The Culver City Unified School District and the Culver City Federation of Teachers have completed negotiations for the 2009-2010 school year and agree to maintain the provisions of the current certificated collective bargaining agreement for 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 school years, except as provided below:

ARTICLE 25 (HOURS)/ARTICLE 32 (WAGES)

REDUCED WORK YEAR

Reduce the school work year for certificated unit members by five (5) days for the 2010-2011 school year, with a commensurate proportionate reduction in salary.

OTHER

- Negotiate the calendar to reflect the negotiated reduced work year for school year 2010-2011.
- Article 32, Section E. 1 a: Twelve (12) semester units or eighteen (18) quarter units of college or university work, shall be the maximum allowance of credit in any one teaching year, September-June, for placement on the salary schedule (no exceptions to the maximum allowable units), except if a certificated unit member is enrolled in an accredited accelerated Master's program at a college or university.

• **DURATION**

Article 3—Duration and Termination

Section A:

This agreement shall become effective on 1st day of July, 2009 unless otherwise specifically stated herein, and shall remain in full force and effect until June 30, 2012, and shall automatically renew itself for an additional year unless either party notifies the other by giving at least ninety (90) days, but not more than one-hundred-twenty (120) days written notice in advance of the expiration date of its desire to modify or amend this agreement. The parties may reopen negotiations for the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 school years on Article 31: Health and Welfare, and Article 32: Wages, and two (2) articles selected by each party.

ARTICLE 27—Elementary Preparation Time: See Attachment.

ARTICLE 29—Evaluation:

Section C, 2: Employees to be evaluated under Section 44660-44665 of the Education Code will be so notified by their immediate supervisor during the first school month of the school year. Unit members may request in writing a meeting with their principal or designee to discuss the evaluation process.

CLASS TITLE: SPECIALIZED ACADEMIC INSTRUCTOR

BASIC FUNCTION

Instruct special education students individually and in small groups in accordance with District policies and procedures aligned with IDEA and state regulations; develop and implement IEP goals, assess students, and coordinate programs to increase independence and ability to function in society, socially, vocationally and academically.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

Design and implement curriculum and lesson plans for individualized and group instruction; schedule instructional periods; assess student progress; teach subjects aligned with state curriculum standards in math, reading, language arts, and other subjects; modify instruction and student work to meet student needs; utilize specialized software as necessary; maintain related records.

Instruct students with special education needs regarding individualized tasks to implement and achieve IEP goals, including study skills and CAHSEE preparation.

Participate as a member of IEP teams; attend IEP meetings; develop and provide input to IEP goals; conduct pre and post-assessments and perform other data collection; prepare IEP reports and maintain inter-agency and district contacts regarding IEP's.

Utilize district system of IEP data using computerized web-based system.

Perform and/or supervise trained assistants as assigned in specialized physical health care procedures in accordance with specialized training provided by health staff; operate and instruct students and staff in the use of various apparatus to assist in mobility, lifting and positioning of students.

Assure the proper implementation and monitoring of objectives and progress for each student by trained individuals in accordance with IEP's, including positioning and range of motion activities.

Perform specialized duties as assigned in such areas as behavior, vision, movement, and others while working with students, teachers, instructional assistants, and other staff.

Identify, support and monitor accommodations from the current IEP.

Provide for the personal hygiene of students including toileting, diapering, feeding, and caregiving; teach self-help skills involving personal hygiene; teach recreational/leisure skills.

Design, implement and monitor progress of appropriate behavior management strategies for use in instructional and disciplinary purposes.

Plan and supervise field trips to the community for shopping or self-help teaching purposes or to other sites consistent with instructional objectives.

Arrange with other teachers and monitor the inclusion of students in regular school classrooms.

Communicate with parents; conduct initial interviews and conferences with parents; discuss student progress with parents on an on-going basis.

Train instructional assistant staff to support curricular goals and student progress. Coordinate work direction and provide guidance to assigned instructional staff regarding job duties.

Participate in a variety of special project teams and committees; participate in teacher and staff meetings and other in-service training programs as requested by district and Pupil Services Department.

Prepare a variety of reports for parents, police, community agencies, administration and others.

Interface with other teachers, psychologists, and other staff regarding student progress.

Provide job coaching, vocational training and other skills.

Perform related duties as assigned.
